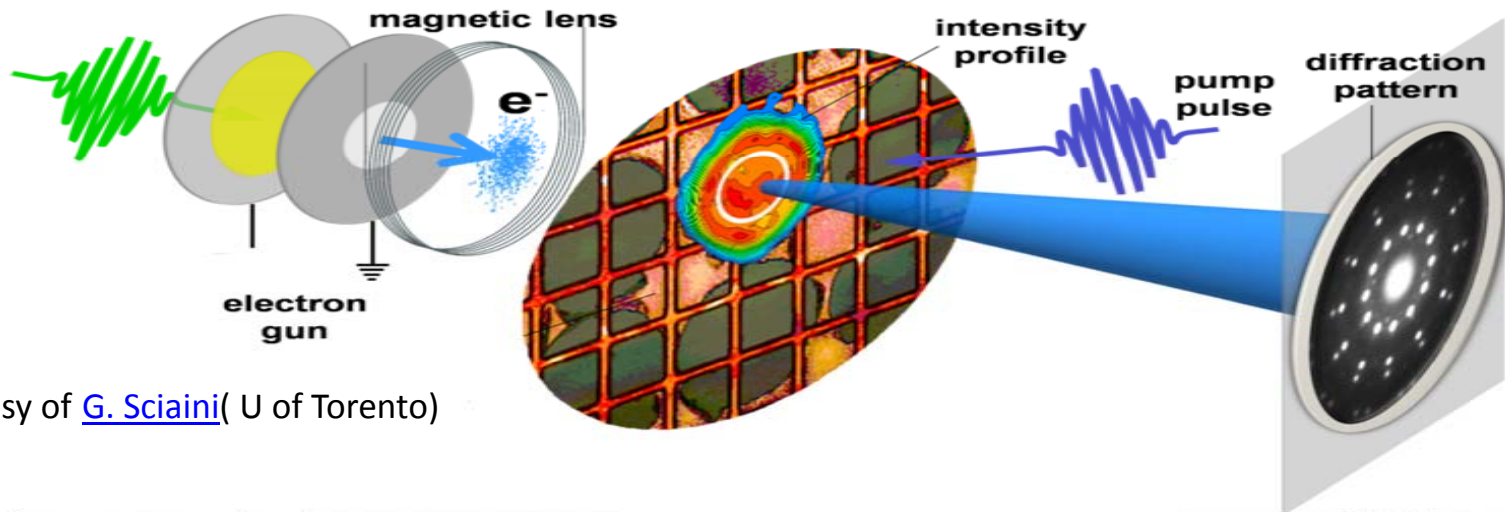
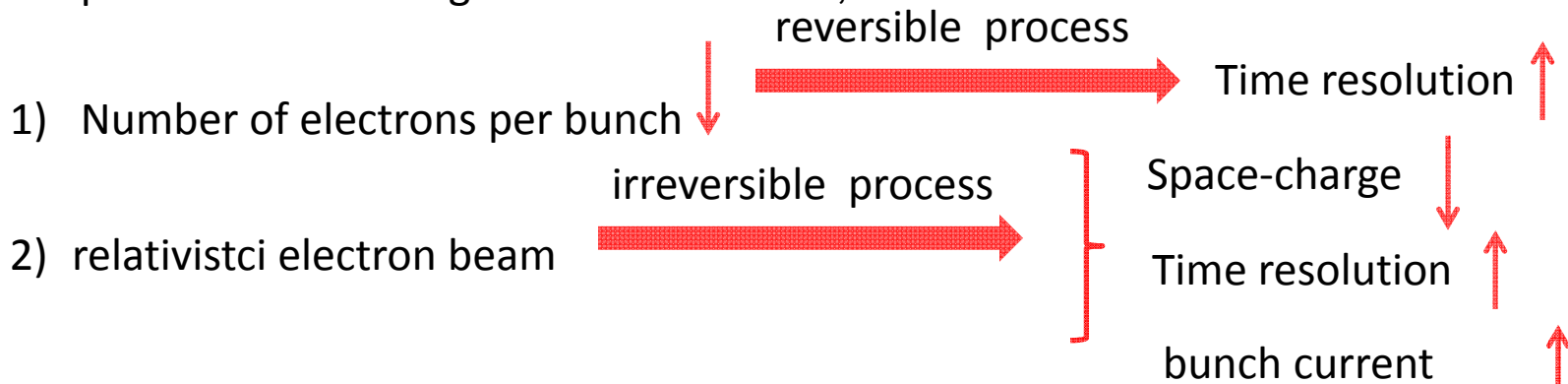

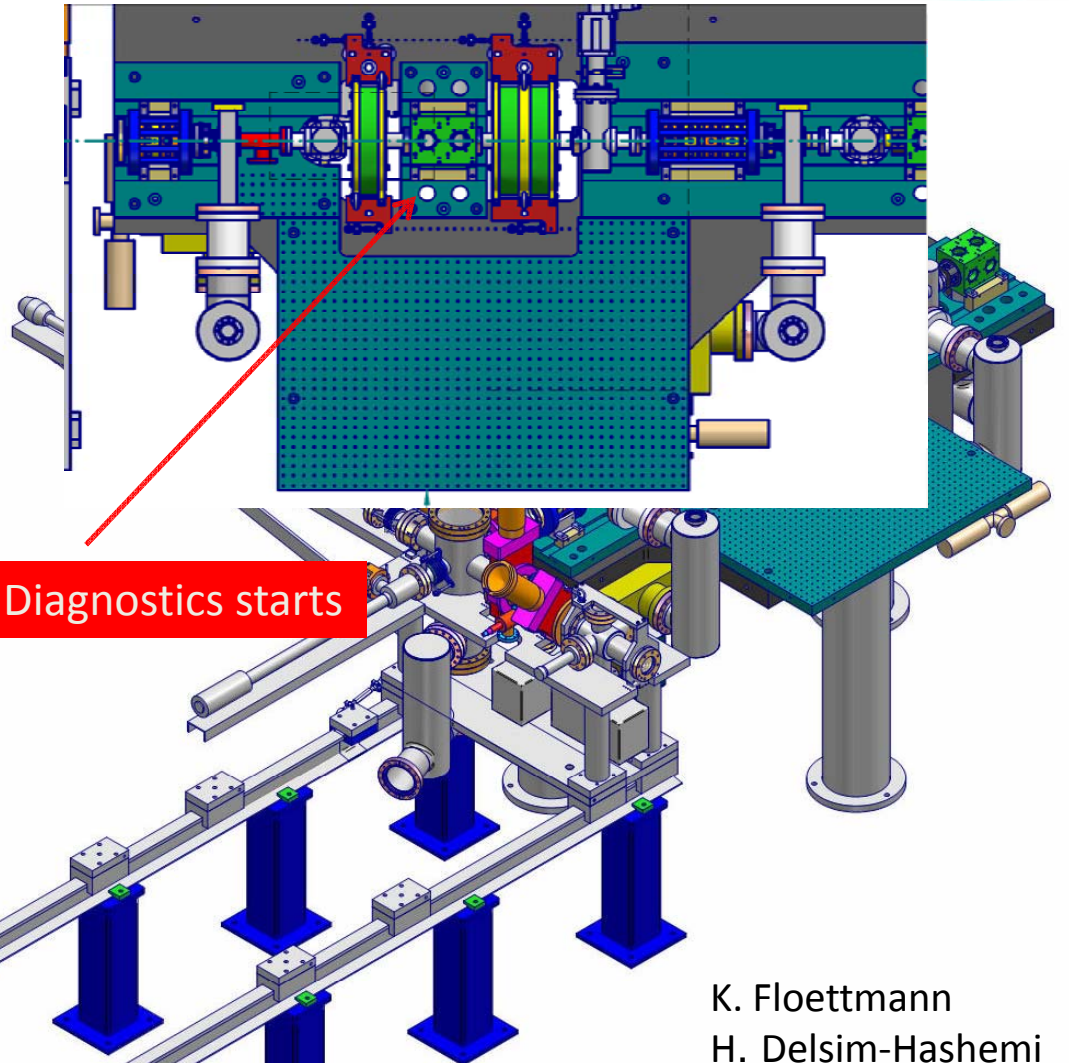
## REGAE (Relativistic Electron Gun for Atomic Exploration)

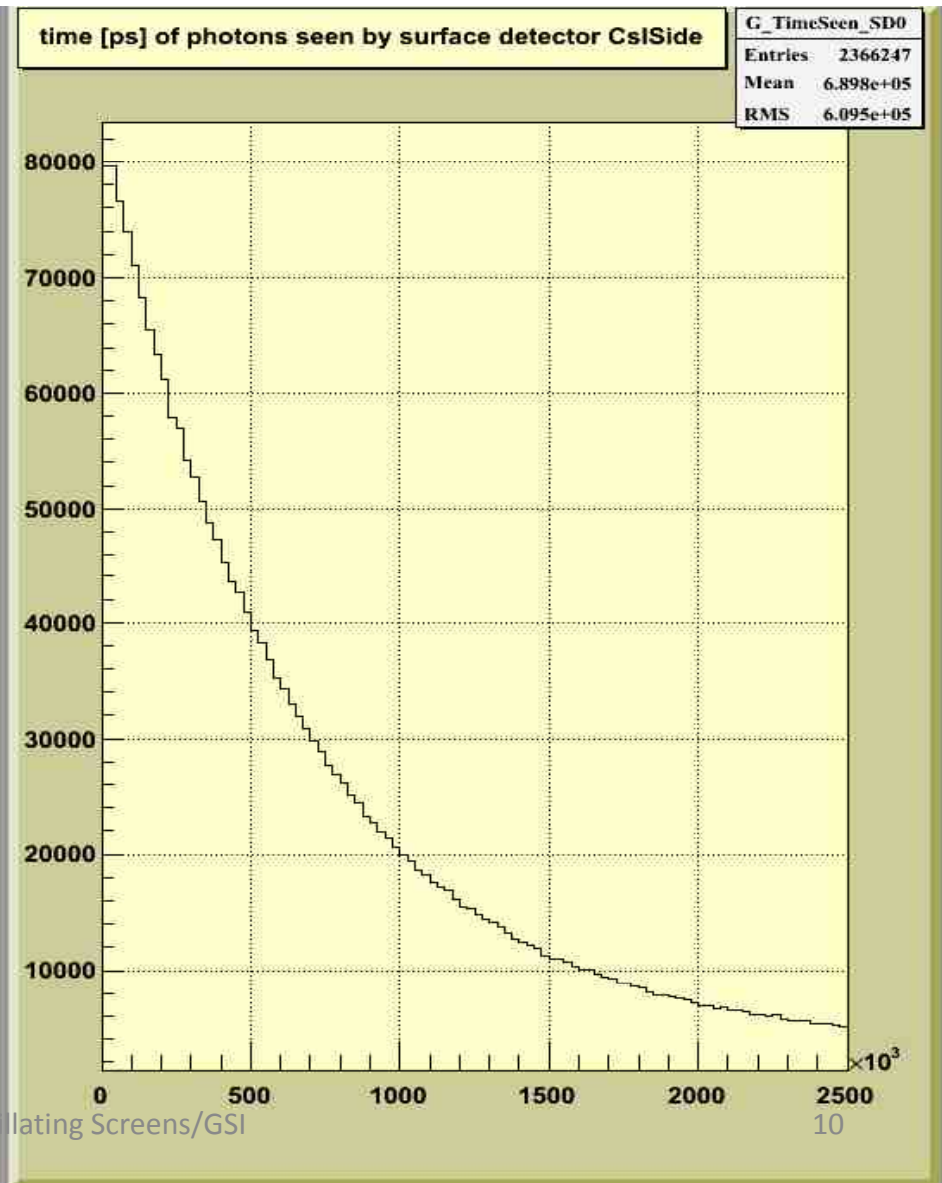
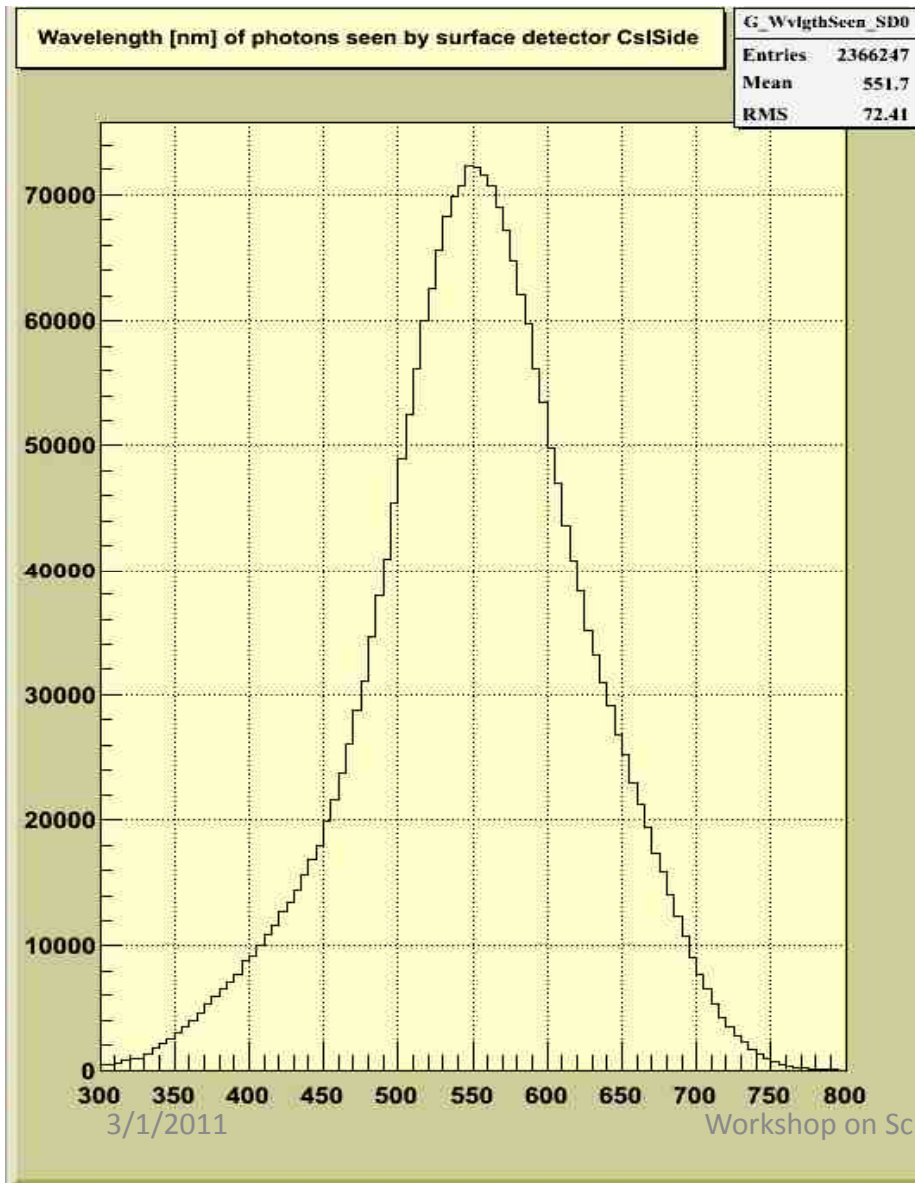
## Light TRansmission in ANIsotropic media

- The program takes into account the variation of the physical parameters as a function of the wavelength.

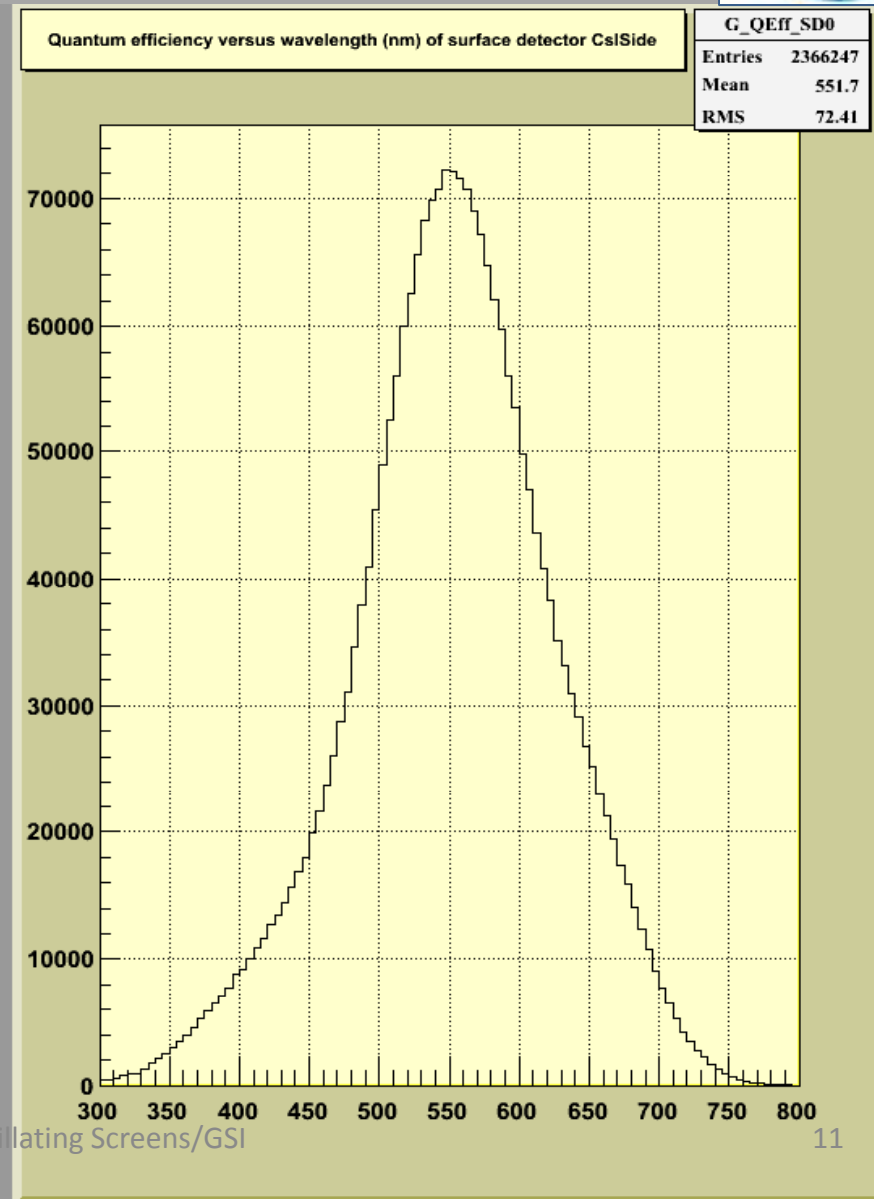
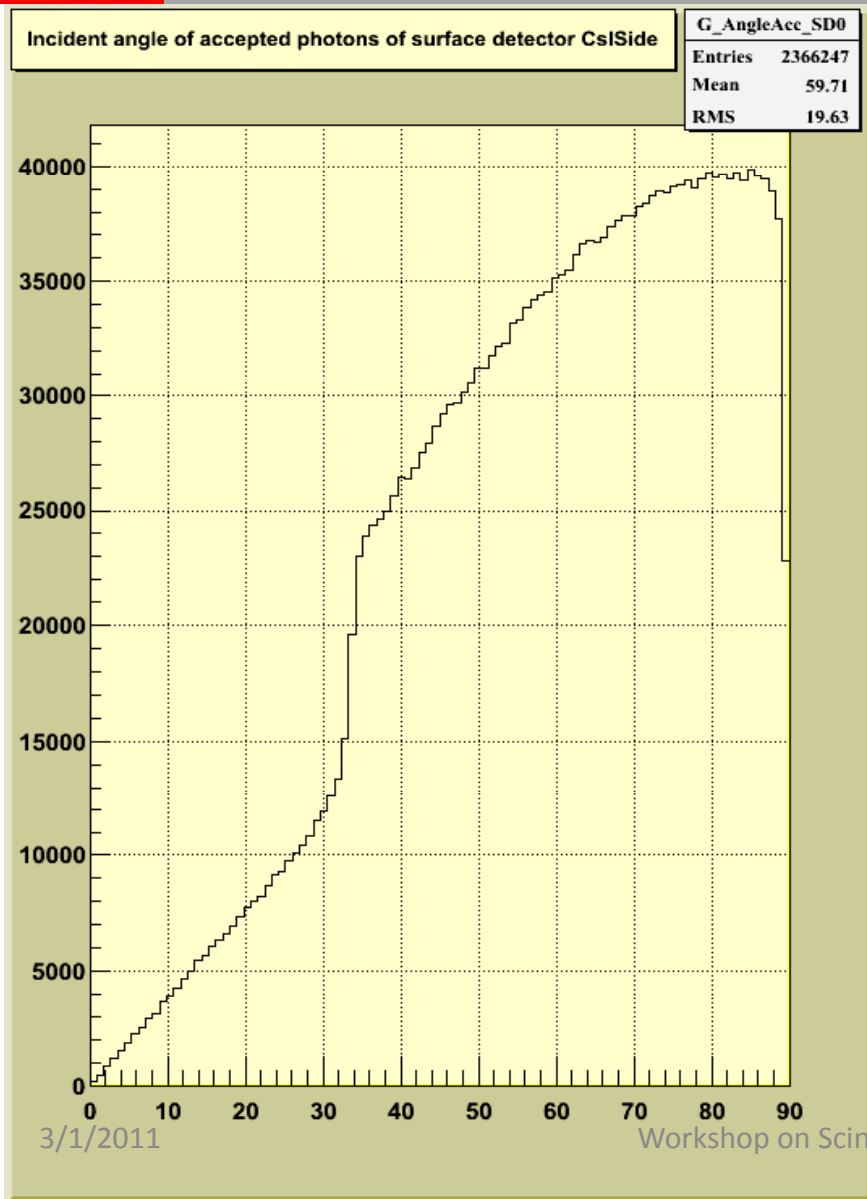

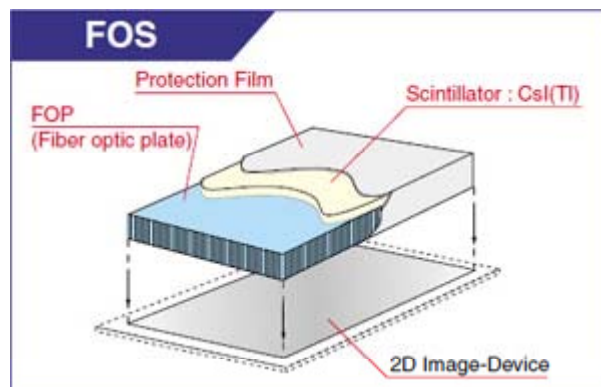




## No result for LYSO yet ☹️
